### Exam 1 Instructions and Questions

#### 1. General Instructions

Please read all of the following instructions carefully for your exam and follow the Directions for Exam Submission at the end of this page. For full credit, you must submit your exam essay according to these instructions, so please do review them thoroughly.

#### **Due Date:**

Your Exam must be submitted before the deadline (see your Assignment Schedule for the correct due date/time) in order to receive credit. You will not be able to access the link to submit your Exam after the deadline has passed, so make sure that you give yourself plenty of time to submit before the deadline.

#### **Writing Instructions:**

For this exam, choose one of the possible questions and prepare a thorough response essay of **900-1200 words**. Depending on the program and font you use to write your exam essay, this will be between 3 1/2-5 pages of written text. Regardless of the page length, however, you must write a minimum of 900 words to meet the minimum requirement for this assignment. For your exam, write a well-organized essay that is clearly written with well-polished prose, grammar, and mechanics. Essays that don't reflect these guidelines will be marked down.

Make sure your exam essay has both a strong central thesis around which your essay is focused and well-organized paragraphs that support and develop your main idea. Be as specific as you can when referring to the film you are analyzing, but do not substitute plot summary for analysis.

You must incorporate at least three quoted passages into this exam essay as evidence to support any claims or observations you make (this is the absolute minimum—you may incorporate more quotes than this). These citations will come from the theoretical articles that have been assigned for each of our film styles. Do not use additional secondary sources on this exam. The point of incorporating these citations is both to develop your argument and to indicate to me that you have read and understood our assigned readings for class.

Make sure you present your quoted material with appropriate and effective signal phrases, and also make sure to use correct citations that clearly mark the page number of the text where you found the quote. For

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this exam essay, there is no need for a works cited page or footnotes to document the source you are quoting from. Just give the page number in a parenthetical citation and make sure to use an effective signal phrase to let me know which of our assigned sources you are quoting from. Do not use quoted material as filler or overuse quotes in place of your own argument and analysis.

Exams will be graded on clarity and completeness of responses, grammar and mechanics, and overall organization, length (including a clear notation of the word count), and the effectiveness and completeness of your use of quoted material. Make sure you follow the specific instructions for incorporating quoted material for each question.

Do not hand in an essay that reads like a draft; make an effort to carefully revise and polish your work. If you are unable to revise your work effectively, take your essay to the Writing Center for assistance with essay development and editing.

This essay exam will constitute approximately 25% of your final grade for the course (100 points).

### **Formatting Instructions:**

Make sure that you single-space the text of your exam essay and clearly indicate by number which question you are responding to at the top of your essay exam. Please do not re-type the question you are responding to since this creates an unmanageable amount of text in my submission inbox.

For full credit, count the number of words for your essay and write the total on a separate line in **bold** font at the end of your essay. Exams with no word count (or with inaccurate word count) will be marked down.

### **Submission Instructions:**

Once you have finished writing your exam essays, save them on your computer. Make sure you carefully follow all of the Directions for Exam Submission written in bold at the end of this page.

Choose the “Submit Exam Assignment” link from the list of links in blue on the left side of this page. You must use the Assignment Link on Blackboard to submit your Exam.

If you can't see the blue links, you may have to drag the left edge of this dialogue box to uncover the other dialogue box with your link on it. If you still cannot find it, contact the COLT office (the office that maintains the Blackboard server and staffs a HELP Desk to address all of your technology questions, issues, and concerns) for assistance. ## 2. Exam Questions

Choose **one** of the following questions for your exam essay (900-1200 words):

1. Classical Film Theory:  
Choose a recent Hollywood film and argue how it fits into the Classical Film paradigm, focusing on some of the elemental characteristics of Classical Film. You must use your Bordwell and Hanson essays as well as specific examples from the film to support your argument.
2. Classical/Post Classical Film Theory:  
Focusing on John McTiernan's film *Die Hard*, argue how this particular film reflects both the Classical and Post-Classical Film paradigms, focusing on some of the elemental characteristics of each style. You must use both Bordwell essays as well as specific examples from the film to support your argument.
3. Realist Film Theory:  
Focusing on Jim Jarmusch's film *Mystery Train*, argue how it reflects elements of the Realist Film paradigm, focusing on some of the characteristics of Realist Film. You must use your Kracauer, Bazin, and/or Foreman essays as well as specific examples from the film to support your argument.
4. Focusing on either Jim Jarmusch's film *Stranger Than Paradise*, Lars Von Trier's *Breaking the Waves*, or Vittorio DeSica's *Bicycle Thief*, argue how your chosen film reflects elements of the Realist Film paradigm, focusing on some of the characteristics of Realist Film. You must use your Kracauer, Bazin, and/or Foreman essays to support your argument as well as specific examples from the film.

**Note:** While each question mandates that you use certain theoretical essays to support and develop the argument you present in your exam, you may, in addition, quote from any of the essays that have been assigned this semester (including our optional essays). Do not, however, use other additional primary or secondary theoretical sources that were not assigned for class as part of this essay exam.
